Current COVID-19 Related 4-H Meeting Guidance

Current guidance is available at this link: <u>https://4h.extension.wisc.edu/4-h-faqs-related-to-covid-19/.</u> Effective June 2, all fully vaccinated Wisconsin 4-H staff, volunteers and participants are no longer required to wear masks during programs. We ask that individuals who are not fully vaccinated, including youth under 12, continue to wear masks. Staff and volunteers will not enforce mask wearing or ask for proof of vaccination for those not wearing masks. Masks may still be worn if preferred and individual masking choices should not be interpreted as an indicator of vaccination status.

- Outdoors: Physical distancing is no longer required outdoors for vaccinated people. Individuals who are not vaccinated should maintain 6 feet of physical distancing and, if physical distancing is not possible, wear a face covering.
- Indoors: There are no group size limits on indoor gatherings as long as a minimum of 6 feet of physical distancing is able to maintained, regardless of vaccination status.
- Transportation: Any individual who is not vaccinated should wear a face covering when driving or riding with others. Vehicle occupancy is recommended to be no more than 50 percent of capacity when traveling with an unvaccinated individual(s).

This updated policy applies to all Wisconsin 4-H programs including overnight programs, 4-H programs at county fairs and food stands. As a reminder, Wisconsin 4-H staff, volunteers and participants should continue to follow local public health guidance.

In-person meeting record keeping continues to be required. If your club/group/project plans to meet in-person you must fill out a Google Form notifying us of your in-person programming and meetings. The form can be

Walworth County 4-H Day Camp was held at the fairgrounds on June 15-16 for 63 campers (grades 3-8) and 19 counselors. Both days began at 8:30 a.m. and ended at 7:15 p.m. and featured a variety of favorite camp activities (arts and crafts, nature science and exploration, recreation, drama, and water carnival) led by members of the counselor team. Thank you to Walworth County Shooting Sports instructors Colin Horlacher and Richard Netzinger for leading two days of air rifle workshops, as well. Evening programs included slightly modified versions of beloved camp traditions such as a camp drama/dance night, whole group games, and a closing campfire. An "Animals of the World" program was also presented by the Racine Zoo Education Department. A huge thank you goes to all of the adult volunteers who stepped up to chaperone; their time and efforts were tremendously appreciated.

Spring '21 Outreach Summary

- The spring <u>Discover 4-H</u> project series was held in February and March for 113 youth from a 6-county area (20% from Walworth County. Participants completed age-appropriate kit-based hands-on activities related to *Food Science,* Nature Science, Photography, and Art. Workshops were conducted by Extension educators and program partners.
- A series of four kit-based hands-on project workshops were conducted weekly for ten third grade afterschool participants in Delavan during the month of March. Workshops were hybrid programs in which the 4-H Youth Development Educator instructed virtually for an in-person class facilitated by afterschool program adult facilitators.
- The eight-week 2021 season of the <u>4-H Science Explorers: Scientists Live</u> virtual careers series was hosted during March and April. The series targeted youth, grades 8-13, and aimed to quickly and meaningfully expose youth to a variety of STEM-related careers for consideration as they make their post-secondary plans. Recordings of the episodes will soon

be available for long-term viewing by additional participants and classroom teachers. A total of 42 program registrants (33% Walworth County), including two teachers, participated in this program weekly putting program reach at 336 overall contacts. 4-H Science Explorers programming is a collaborative effort between Walworth, Lafayette, and Crawford Counties, and UW-Madison BioTrek staff. Nine high school teachers (33% Walworth County) have accessed the 2020 recording reaching up to an additional 308 local youth.

- Twenty-one Walworth County classrooms hatched eggs as part of this year's <u>Walworth County 4-H</u> <u>Eggsploring Incubation Science Lab</u>, reaching a total of 428 youth.
- The <u>4-H Science Explorers--Into the Lab</u> series consisted of five kit-based hands-on virtual workshops and was designed to 1) expose middle school youth to a variety of science fields; 2) showcase science as fun and achievable, and 3) grow youths' science content knowledge and skills. The program, held March 25-April 22, featured virtual "lab tours" focused on *Veterinary Science, Materials Engineering, Biotechnology,* and *Forensic Science* and engaged youth in utilizing suturing practice kits, building a simple triboelectric generator, extracting DNA from wheat germ, performing chromatography analysis and dusting for fingerprints. The program concluded with a virtual escape room challenge participants completed in small groups as a fun and interactive way of problem solving and reviewing concepts learned. A total of 29 youth participated (17 from Walworth County). Program partners included Dr. Christine Fortin, Center Hill Veterinary, Darlington; Tom Zinnen & Liz Jesse, UW-Madison Biotechnology Center; Jason Kawasaki, UW-Madison; and Tim Juedes, UW-Platteville. The program is sponsored, in part, by a grant from the WI 4-H Foundation.
- The <u>4-H Science Explorers--Night at the Museum</u> program for youth, grades 3-5, wrapped up on May 13. This three-session program was held face-to-face on two evenings and virtually on one. The program combined presentations by five museums with relative hands-on science activities designed to showcase science as diverse, fun, and achievable. Thirty-five youth (18 from Walworth County) grew "space seeds," engineered flowers, observed river otter behavior, tested the effects of oil pollution on natural objects, studied fossils, and built edible moon phase models as part of the experience. Sponsored, in-part, by the WI 4-H Foundation, this series was done in collaboration with Lafayette and Crawford Counties.
- The 2020 <u>4-H Science Explorers--Scientists Live</u> program was formally honored as the 2021 recipient of the Specialty Award Excellence in STEM Team Award by the Wisconsin Association of Extension 4-H Youth Development Professionals (WAE4-HYDP) on May 25. The fall, 2020 <u>Discover 4-H/Explore 4-H</u> program was honored by WAE4-HYDP as the 2021 recipient of the Denise Miller National 4-H Innovator Award. Both advanced for NC Regional award consideration.
- The **Owl Encounter** and **Reduced to a Pulp 4-H Science Labs** were conducted for 64 second graders at Turtle Creek School during April and May. These programs are designed to showcase science as fun and achievable while teaching science content and life skills. *Owl Encounter* engages youth in a fast-paced barn owl study coupled with owl pellet dissection. *Reduced to a Pulp* explores products and services trees provide and considers the value of recycling paper. It then engages youth in physically turning paper from a recycling bin into brand new paper using simple equipment.
- A 90-minute science workshop event was conducted for 22 Elkhorn OPtions homeschool students on May 26 at the Walworth County fairgrounds. All youth, grades K-8, participated in an age-appropriate tree workshop focused on sensory awareness and scientific descriptors of leaves and bark. Youth, grades K-3, also participated in a terrarium workshop while those in grades 4-8 learned about GPS and completed a geocaching scavenger hunt.
